

SALLY'S BOOK CORNER

With the approach of the Days of Awe, the time is near when we pause for reflection on the past year and when we look toward self improvement in the coming year. Some books that reflect this spirit are:

A CODE OF JEWISH ETHICS, VOLUME 1, YOU SHALL BE HOLY by Rabbi Joseph Telushkin. In Judaism, ethical codes are found in sacred writings, anecdotes, medieval codes, rabbinical teaching and in present-day stories. Rabbi Telushkin plans to present his research on Jewish Ethics in three volumes. This first volume is divided into five sections: The Tasks of a Lifetime. Basic Virtues and Vices, Fair Speech, Leading a Holy Life, and God and Ethics. According to Jehuda Reinharz, Richard Koret professor of modern Jewish history and president of Brandeis University, this is "an extraordinarily learned and inspiring work on Jewish ethics, written with style and clarity and suitable for experts as well as those unfamiliar with Jewish texts. Jewish ethics have been evolving for four centuries, and Telushkin provides us with a comprehensive introduction."

THE LADDER OF JACOB: ANCIENT INTERPRETATIONS OF THE BIBLICAL STORY OF JACOB AND HIS CHILDREN by James L. Kugel. Kugel, whom we know from his previous book, THE BIBLE AS IT WAS, now takes us on a tour of the meanings and

methods of ancient biblical interpretation by using the stories of Jacob and his children (Gen. 28-35) as a case study. As we well know, Genesis covers the dysfunctional family of our forefathers. Ancient readers must have been troubled, as we are today, by these stories. In THE LADDER OF JACOB, Kugel retraces the steps of ancient biblical interpreters as they worked to interpret these stories. Kugel traces their steps as he goes back to examine the Midrash with a careful analysis of these retellings.

by Rena Potok. A vast array of poems from the Song of Songs to Lamentations are contained in this volume. Each poem in English is from the 1985 JPS English translation while the original Hebrew is placed on the facing page. The introduction to this collection by Andrea L. Weiss, is an extensive essay entitled, "Introduction to Biblical Poetry". The poems are arranged thematically into nine broad sections to provide a sense of the many poetic genres and topics appearing in the Bible: Blessings, Prayers and Songs of Praise, Poetic Moments, Testaments and Pronouncements, Laments, Judgment Oracles, Prophecies of Salvation and Consolation, Wisdom Writings, and Love Songs.

A BISSL UN A BISSL

From Hadassah. Hadassah received the National Advocacy Award given by the Genetics Policy Institute (GPI) for work in promoting awareness of the lifesaving cause of stem cell research. The award coincides with the beginning of Hadassah's new medical campaign which focuses on the groundbreaking research undertaken by the Hadassah Medical Organization (HMO) in Jerusalem. Dr. Benjamin Reubinoff and his staff at HMO will target Parkinson's as the first disease to be conquered using new stem cell therapies.

From Forward (July 28,2006). If you happen to be traveling near Malibu, California, don't stop at the beach, but head toward Oxnard to find the Baron Herzog Winery for the ultimate experience in kosher gastronomy. But don't go without making a reservation first. Not only does the winery offer a great variety of kosher wines, but also has a five star restaurant which features extensive international wines and a prix fixe wine tasters meal, available at both lunch and dinner times.

From the New York Times (8/21/2006). Talmudic scholar and bioethicist Dina Najman (pronounced NIGH-man) will now head Kehilat Orach Eliezer, a small Upper West Side Orthodox congregation in Manhattan. The appointment, which entails rabbinical duties without requiring ordination, is a milestone for advocates of an expanded role for women in Orthodox Judaism.

From Pakn Treger (Summer, 2006). Beginning readers of Yiddish are often disconcerted by the Hebrew words they encounter in Yiddish texts. Coming to their aid is a new book, A GUIDE TO THE MORE COMMON HEBRAIC WORDS IN YIDDISH by Steven A.. Jacobson. The book has two sections, one with the traditional Hebrew spelling and one with the phonetic Yiddish spelling, so one can locate the word either by how it is traditionally spelled or by how it sounds, along with brief definitions. The definitions can be useful, as familiar Hebrew words can take an unexpect turn in Yiddish colloquial use. For example, mekhaye, which in Hebrew means "resurrection", in Yiddish means a delight. The book has been newly reissued under the National Yiddish Book Center's imprint.

From A Little Joy, A Little Oy. Calvin Trillin, in his book about his father, wrote, "My father, he sort of collected Yiddish curses. He heard one woman yell at a butcher that she was mad at, "May you have an injury that is not covered by workmen's compensation." That was his favorite curse.

From Forward. A Viennese court ordered the Republic of Austria to give up all claims to five Gustav Klimpt paintings and return them to their rightful owner, Maria Altmann and her family. Then, Altmann, whose aunt, Adele Bloch-Bauer, was the subject and owner of the paintings, became the beneficiary of a record-breaking sale when cosmetic magnate Ronald Lauder offered her \$135 million for one of the paintings, Adele's portrait, named "Lady in Gold" for his gallery, Neue Galerie. The other four Klimpts were also purchased, and all five works were exhibited at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art before moving the the Neue Galerie in July where they will remain on exhibit until September 18.

From Hadassah Magazine (June/July 2006). New York's egalitarian Kehilat Hadar shows that when it comes to congregational singing, there are new melodies. This collection of 10 Shabbat tunes, plus 9 for the High Holidays draws on everything from modern classics by Shlomo Carlebach to the "Lekha Dodi" of Uganda's Abayudaya. All are chanted by Kehilat Hadar members.

From New York Times, (August 15, 2006) An article by John Noble Wilford states that new archaeological evidence is raising more questions about the conventional interpretation linking the Qumran caves with the Dead Sea Scrolls. Two Israeli archeologists now assert that Qumran had nothing to do with the Essenes or a monastery or the scrolls. It had been a pottery factory. Moreover, the scrolls in the caves were probably written by many different groups and were removed from Jerusalem libraries by refugees in the Roman war.
